Saturday 9 June, concert with Men2sing

Situated in the centre of Newmarket, St Mary's Church was the venue for this concert, our second or even third visit. As is usually the case, with the stone pillars and wooden pews, the church had good acoustics. Although the pews were not too comfortable, the sound of the music was a recompense. SEMVC opened with *Amen*, raising audience awareness and interest in what this concert would be about. Followed by *Seal Lullaby* (so evocative of the sea and shoreline), *The Rose*, *Shenandoah*, the first set finished with the traditional Joseph Parry's *Aberystwyth*.

Men²Sing led with a more recent and popular selection starting with *Mr Blue Sky*, *Walking in Memphis*, *Love of my Life* and the more traditional *How can I keep from Singing*. The powerful music of Freddie Mercury and *Don't Stop me Now* was a good rendition considering the difficulty of the score and none of the backing that Queen have in their recordings. The calming music of *Bridge over Troubled Water* was a different arrangement to that which SEMVC sing, but suitable for the sound that makes this enthusiastic choir so different to that of the usual male voice choir sound.

After the interval Men2Sing sang more popular favourites, many of the arrangements by their musical director, John Trent Wallace. Sting's *Fields of Gold*, *Only You*, *Haven't Met you yet*, *Crazy little thing called Love* were rounded off by *Bui Doi* (from *Miss Saigon*) recalling the tragedy of the American/Vietnamese babies left behind by the American soldiers at the end of the Vietnamese War.


SEMVC followed this appropriately in their inimitable style, accompanied by Simon and Calvin, singing *Angels*. MD Mark Jefferson gave an informative introduction to *Cantique de Jean Racine*. After two Burt Bacharach numbers, *Mustang Sally* was sung with SEMVC's usual gusto.



Both choirs singing together, *The Lord's Prayer* had subtle differences to the arrangement SEMVC usually sing, and finally *What would I do Without my Music?*. This last says it all for male voice choirs. The expertise of the SEMVC and the enthusiasm of Men₂Sing produced a very interesting evening of music for those of us lucky enough to attend. Dianne F

The Royal Albert Hall, Saturday 19 May

I experienced the joy of attending the Welsh Association of Male Choirs 'Festival of Massed Male Voice Choirs' (formerly known as 'Thousand Voices Festival') which is held every three years. New seating together with H & S regulations has required the number of performers to be reduced to 850 maximum. Formed in 1962, the Welsh Association of Male Choirs has arranged such festivals at the Royal Albert Hall since 1978.

Current choir membership is 91 with 11 of those being from elsewhere in the UK. This includes our very good friends, the Mansfield & District Male Choir who were present at this event. Festival Conductor was Dr Alwyn Humphreys MBE, with guest artists Bella Voce, a 16-piece all female vocal group



based in West Wales, soprano Ffion Edwards, tenor Rhydian Jenkins, and soprano Samantha Oxborough.

Rhayader MVC participated; our one-time top tenor Peter Byron has joined them, though he was not there. I was most curious to read in the programme of Rhayader MVC that "like many choirs these days we are becoming quite 'senior' with an average age approaching 130!" I think somebody's mathematics is a little awry, don't you?

It was a wonderful evening of very varied music from everyone. Alwyn Humphreys maintained a tight hold on the massed voices with several examples of controlled singing. For me though, the passages of "ff's" that I was looking forward to were in danger of being drowned out by the over-enthusiastic ministrations of the Festival Organist, Huw Tregelles Williams OBE on the mighty Royal Albert Hall Grand Organ. It is the second largest organ in the world with 147 stops and 9,997 speaking pipes so not surprising that the choirs found it difficult to compete! While I experience more spine-tingling goose bumps when SEMVC sing on form than I received this evening, I am so glad I made the effort to attend. I would thoroughly recommend it to anyone for the future. Barry C
